

When you use verbs to talk about the weather, pay attention to the verb form:

- If you are talking about the current weather, use the present continuous: <u>It's raining</u> outside.
- If you are talking about the **usual weather** in some place, use the **present simple**: <u>It often rains</u> in London in the wintertime.

Celsius and Fahrenheit

In the US, the temperatures are shown in Fahrenheit. This is how you can quickly find out what the temperature (approximately) is:

From Fahrenheit to Celsius: Subtract thirty and divide by two

From Celsius to Fahrenheit: Double it and add thirty
